British Designer Sir Paul Smith Unveils His Interior for Maggie's Nottingham November 2nd 2011.

For the first time, Maggie's have approached a designer to create the interior of one of their architecturally-designed cancer caring centres.

Working closely with the building's designer, renowned architect Piers Gough, Paul Smith is delighted to have created the interior design for the charity's newest centre situated on the grounds of City Hospital in his home town of Nottingham.

Paul Smith has designed an environment which complements the programme of care and support offered by Maggie's. Paul has carefully combined a selected mix of classic and iconic furniture items with interesting ornamental pieces in an array of textures, finishes all featuring quirky details synonymous with Paul Smith.

Paul Smith said: "I am delighted to be involved in creating this centre for people living with cancer and their family and friends. It will be a great resource for everyone and a fantastic new addition to the city. Piers Gough is an incredible architect and it has been a joy to work together on the design. I wanted the interior to be somewhere calm, warm and restful; a place where visitors could go to have time to think and have a cup of tea."

The building consists of a large kitchen, two sitting rooms, a library, an office, three smaller therapy rooms and a larger room which can be divided in two for tai chi, yoga or meetings.

Decoration and design follows the purpose of the centre's rooms and spaces. Key design details include; a natural wood flooring pattern which mirrors that of the building's roof; Ercol butterfly chairs painted in bright red, yellow and orange; Fired Earth tiling; Jonathan Adler dog sculptures and subtle lighting created by 1950's table lamps and freestanding tripod lights. The centre has a number of Paul Smith home items ranging from tapestry wall hangings, colourful rugs, vintage prints, drawings and Maharam exaggerated plaid fabrics. Paul Smith Melrose chairs are covered in floral printed fabric taken from a photograph captured by Sir Paul at the Chelsea Flower Show.

Cancer charity Maggie's, now in its 15th year with as many locations, provides free practical, emotional and psychological support for anyone affected by cancer along with their family, friends and carers.
